"One last look at infinity, then the warmth of home", Sunita Williams's safe return to Earth

Sunita Williams is a renowned American astronaut of Indian origin, who has made contributions significant space exploration. Williams first ventured into space in December 2006 aboard Space Shuttle Discovery on mission STS-116. During her 195-day stay on the ISS, she set a record for the longest spaceflight by a woman at that time. She also conducted four spacewalks, demonstrating her expertise in extravehicular activities. Her return to Earth in June 2007 was marked by extensive research contributions and valuable experience gained microgravity conditions. Recently, she was set to return just eight days after launching on June 5, 2024, aboard Boeing's Starliner spacecraft. However, due to unforeseen technical issues with the Starliner, her mission was prolonged. She returned to Earth on March 18, 2025, after an unplanned nine-month stay aboard the International Space Station (ISS). Williams's mission was initially meant to be a short test flight to validate Starliner's capabilities for future Unfortunately, shortly after docking with the ISS, engineers discovered propulsion system

rescue her and bring her back to Earth safely, NASA ultimately collaborated with SpaceX. The SpaceX Crew-10 mission, launched on March 14, 2025, transported a fresh crew to the ISS while facilitating Williams's return aboard the Crew Dragon capsule.

During her extended nineaboard month mission the International Station Space (ISS), NASA astronaut Sunita Williams contributed to several key scientific endeavors. She established an experiment to study the behavior of liquids and gases in microgravity.

This research is vital for understanding fluid dynamics in space, which has applications in improving life support systems and fuel management in spacecraft. She participated in over 150 experiments, dedicating more than 900 hours to scientific research.

These experiments encompassed

various disciplines, including health studies that human examined effects the of prolonged spaceflight on the human body. Such research is crucial for preparing astronauts for future deep-space missions. Sunita Williams's return was met with relief and celebration, as she once again demonstrated why she remains a pioneering figure in space exploration.

Her journey serves as a reminder of both the risks and rewards of human spaceflight and the everevolving quest for advancements beyond Earth. Her missions contribute to research in space medicine, engineering, and the psychology of long-duration space travel. Each return also symbolizes the success of international cooperation, as she works closely with astronauts from various countries.

Michael Bull: No Dead Air! The iPod and the Culture of Mobile Listening

Bull published 'Sounding Out the City' and 'Sound Moves, iPod Culture and Urban Experience'. The author starts by mentioning how as a kid he watched 'The Music Machine'.

He states that the iPod is similar

In 'Crowded Streets', the author says people create a 'mobile bubble' to avoid sensory overload, crowds, and strangers. The Deadly Toll of Hustle Culture and The Urgent Need for Work-Life Balance

Amid today's rapidly advancing competitive society, employees face greater pressure to surpass their own achievements and each other. Gruelling shifts along with pressing expectations and tight deadlines have led to a damaging culture in the workplace. This atmosphere achievement; guarantees however, it usually causes fatigue and health decline. In recent years, job stress has strongly been linked to an increase in health problems.

A recent case of the death of an EY worker brings these concerns to the forefront. It was discovered that the employee died at home after allegedly spending too much time at work without fair financial rewards. Currently, investigations are underway relating to this case which serves as a mirror to society at large, highlighting the bigger problem of stressed workers succumbing to excessive workloads. People are starting to view these cases more as common than rare. The global push towards hustle culture, where employees are constantly encouraged to "give their 110%" or "go the extra mile," has led to a concerning normalization of stress, sleep deprivation, and unhealthy lifestyle habits. The WHO reports a steep rise in stress-related issues over the course of the previous decade and have included work-related exhaustion as an acknowledged medical issue. Diagnosing physical conditions can be easier; however, the mental stress can be equally harmful.

Young professionals face increasing rates of depression and anxiety along with burnout. Employees are often forced to mask their exhaustion, adopting a "grind till you drop" mentality. this structure psychological health neglected since high expectations from deadlines and aroundthe-clock availability prevail. The situation is particularly concerning for younger employees.

Findings demonstrate that young professionals like GenZ or Millennials are at greater danger for psychological struggles as they struggle to excel in an unreliable workplace.

Opinions expressed by business figures exacerbate the problem. For years now Narayana Murthy, business tycoon and co-founder of Infosys, has championed a methodical approach to work.

In his comments that stirred debate, Murthy emphasized the importance of hard work in propelling India to global prominence, suggesting young people today need to put in "at least 70 hours of work a week" to match global standards. Though he sought to enhance the nation's work spirit his words triggered discussions about the health of employees and the long-term viability of demanding working hours.

According to critics of Murthy's vision, the key should be on innovation and productivity instead of mere counting hours. His remarks remind us of the sharp distinction between commitment and overpowering stress.

While corporate leaders promote dedication, there is an urgent necessity for balance and acknowledgment of the human factors associated with productivity measures.

The recent EY case and the discourse around Murthy's comments highlight the need for a fundamental shift in how organizations view work-life balance.

Many companies now offer mental health support programs, flexible working hours, and wellness initiatives, but the systemic problem persists.

Until there is a cultural shift that places employee well-being at the forefront over profit margins and delivery deadlines, the tragedies we're witnessing will continue.

This matter goes beyond ethics; it's essential for improving business efficiency over time.

Hardworking staff have much lower productivity and face a greater risk of leaving or suffering health problems that lead to time off from work.

A drained staff helps nobody; it affects both the staff and their households along with the organizations relying on them.

The death of the 26-year-old EY employee is a stark wake-up call. Today's work culture is fast becoming unsustainable, and without significant changes, more lives could be endangered. It's time for leaders recalibrate organizations to foster expectations, environments that prioritize both mental and physical health, and realize that success isn't defined by hours worked but by the health and happiness of those who contribute to it.

Hema Committee: will the women of the entertainment industry finally get justice?

The Justice Hema Committee was indeed a significant step towards addressing the issues faced by women in the Malayalam film industry. The committee, chaired by retired Kerala High Court Judge Justice K. Hema, included veteran actress Sarada and retired IAS officer K.B. Valsala Kumari as its members. For many years, several reports of sexual assaults, misbehavior, and the term 'casting couch' have been circulating in the entertainment industry. It has been used by power-hungry individuals in the industry for their benefit for many years. Complaining about the issue isn't solving any problem because the people the victims are running away from end up presiding over the major unions for actors. In the United States Of America, during the entire onset of the

#MeToo movement, women came forward with their stories of sexual abuse and harassment, most notably involving producer Harvey Weinstein. In India, we had our share of the movement too, with actress Tanushree Dutta accusing actor Nana Patekar. Although the movement emerged as a social message, it didn't succeed where it mattered most - in effecting real change on the ground. However, with the Justice Hema committee, there is a light at the end of the dark tunnel, as prominent names in the Malayalam cinema industry are being revealed. Women connected to the entertainment industry by profession, are finally coming out with their stories with the hope of getting legal justice. The biggest win for them is AMMA (Association of Malayalam Movie Artists), as the perpetrators who held positions of power for a long time were revealed. Many names surfaced during the investigation, with

women from the industry sharing their harrowing experiences. Sreelekha Mitra revealed a disturbing encounter with Malayalam film director Ranjith Balakrishnan. response to these allegations, Ranjith resigned as Chairman of the Kerala State Chalachitra Academy. The alleged incident occurred during the production of the 2009 film Paleri Manikyam: Pathirakolapathakathinte Katha. An actress disclosed inappropriate behavior from Malayalam film actors Siddique and Riyaz Khan. Subsequently, Siddique stepped down as General Secretary of Association of Malayalam Movie Artists (AMMA). Geetha Vijayan shared her negative experiences with Malayalam film director Thulasidas and producer Aroma Mohan during the filming of Chanchattam in 1991. Sridevika also recounted a distressing encounter with Malayalam film director Thulasidas while

working on Avan Chandiyude Makan in 2007. The Kerala Government has taken the situation seriously and initiated a probe against all the sexual harassment in the industry. The Government of Kerala has set up a Special Investigation Team (SIT) to investigate sexual harassment allegations in the Malayalam film industry. The SIT, led by IG G. Sparjan Kumar and consisting of four senior women IPS officers, will have ADGP H. Venkatesh overseeing its operations. The team comprises S. Ajeetha Begum, DIG; Merin Joseph, SP, Crime Branch; G. Poonkuzhali, AIG, Coastal Police; Aiswarya Dongre, Assistant Director, Kerala Police Academy; V. Ajith, AIG, Law and Order; and S. Madhusoodanan, SP, Crime Branch. Following Kerala's Hema committee, a similar proposal for establishing a committee in West Bengal's Bengali cinema has been proposed to Mamata Bannerjee, Chief Minister Of West Bengal.

This connotes administration's call to withdraw itself from major international bodies and policies like the **UNHRC** (United **Nations** Human Rights Commission), **WHO** (World Health Organisation), the Paris Climate Agreement alongside sanctions being imposed against the ICC (International Criminal Court) and in recent light the proposal of the DEFUND (Disengaging Entirely from the United Nations Debacle) Act which has been drafted Republican Senator Mike Lee from Utah.

The DEFUND Act and its implications

The aforementioned DEFUND (Disengaging Entirely from the United Nations Debacle) Act can render the United Nations toothless which despite having its own share of criticisms has been an effective political administrative body to navigate and soothe conflicts emanating post the second World War.

This signals a murky future for the US-UN relationship as they can culminate into the repeal of the UN Participation Act (1945) and the UN Headquarters (1947)Agreement would result in a bottleneck situation for the financial aids to the United Nations, abolish peacekeeping efforts and create a territorial segmentation where a cordon sanitaire would be born, thus, barricading UN officers of diverse ethnicities to work in the United States towards enabling peace, progress and adherence towards human rights.

Furthermore, the multilateralism based world order is also crippled by the February 6 executive order against the

International Criminal Court (ICC) at Hague, Netherlands. Turning a blind eye towards the crisis in Gaza, Palestine which unleashes a symphony of pogrom and progeny as the lives of uncountable civilians are claimed by the Israel Defence Forces (IDF) and Netanyahu's Zionist policies.

One ought to remember that if not for the ICC, the Nuremberg trials (1945) an instance of the potential of political diplomacy rooted in pluralist principles where US chief prosecutor Ralph Jackson stated that "the willingness to submit enemies to the rule of law marked a triumph of reason over power" would not have taken place to hold Nazi Germany accountable for anti-Semitism and human rights violations, sectarianism, systemic violence and genocide against its citizens.

Impacts on the politicoeconomic landscape

In the contemporary sociopolitical epoch, Trump's actions of economic ultra-nationalism to implement heaps of reciprocal tariffs under the mask of "MAGA (Make America Great Again)" is akin to the disastrous Smoot-Hawley Tariff Act (1931) which created the material conditions that caused the devastating Great Depression which exacerbated into the second World War.

However, it was due to the implementation of the 1947 General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) with its ethos in multilateral politics and

rules-based international law that gave birth to the World Trade Organisation (WTO).

Dialog, thus, should not cease to be a means of achieving social, political and cultural progress. Thus, it is an imperative to work towards fostering an inclusive multilateral geopolitical scenario which would be crucial in nuanced garnering opinions on ever-resonant issues of Climate Change, Genocide, Human Rights, warfare, nuclear weaponry regulation and enabling political stability as envisioned in the ways of visionaries like Bertrand Russel and Albert Einstein.


Something knocked on my door at night, A shadow on the floor, Whispered tales of past and 'what might', Of love that is no more.

Maybe if I call it by its name, It won't feel so vast, Perhaps like floating clouds, This too shall pass.







