Astronauts Sunita Lyn 'Suni' Williams and Barry Eugene 'Butch' Wilmore, post an unexpected stay at the In-

ternational Space Station (ISS) for more than nine months, their Dragon Crew spacecraft carrying the two astronauts, alongside American Nick Hague and Russian cosmonaut Aleksandr Gorbunov. streaked through time and space before deploying parachutes for a gensplashdown upon the Florida coast at 5:57 p.m. EDT (3:27 am concluding their mission Wednesday. Owing to things turning awry for the fact that their original spacebecame craft plagued with afflictions of helium leaks amidst

other malfunctions, uncertainty creeped in as the miniscule tenure of eight days stretched up to nine months. NASA keeps records of astronauts who have spent the most time in space, (single time or through their careers) which is held by NASA astronaut Frank Rubio, who spent 371 days aboard the ISS.


The two astronauts flew to the orbital lab in June last year, on what was supposed to be a days-long roundtrip

to test Boeing's Starliner on its first crewed flight. The spaceship, however, developed propulsion problems and was deemed unfit to fly back and later returned empthe landing during the return trip by reducing its velocity and relying on Earth's gravity to pull it back. The capsule penetrated Earth's atmosphere at speeds of up

SpaceX Crew Dragon seamlessly directed

to 28,800 km/h, generating intense friction and temperatures. Heat shields protected the crew, and astronauts tend to experience G-forces up to five times Earth's gravity during that phase. As the capsule decelerated, small stabilising drogue chutes were deployed at first, followed by larger parachutes to minimise descent speed. In recent years, the transition from winter to spring has become increasingly difficult to notice, as the scorching heat of summer seems to arrive almost immediately. The gentle, pleasant days of spring, once marked by blooming flowers and mild breezes. moment before the oppressive heat of summer takes over. This phenomenon, often referred to as "season creep," is a direct consequence of global climate change, which is altering the length and intensity of seasons.

Traditionally, spring has

provided a necessary buffer between the harsh cold of winter and the intense heat of summer. However, due to rising global temperatures, spring is getting shorter, and summers are becoming longer and hotter. Scientific studies have found that over the past few decades, spring

has shortened by nearly nine days, while summer has extended by about 13 days. This shift means that as soon as winter fades away, temperatures rise drastically, leaving litletle room for the mild and refreshing weather that spring once brought. One of the main reasons

behind this rapid transition is the alarming rate of global warming. The Earth's average temperature surface has increased by about 1.46°C above pre-industrial levels, with 2024 being the warmest year on record, surpassing 2023 by 0.1°C. This continuous rise in temperature is accelerating the seasonal shifts, making summers more intense and prolonged. For instance, the summer of 2023 saw record-breaking heat waves in many parts of the world, with temperatures soaring beyond 45°C in some regions. Such extreme heat conditions are now occurring earlier in the year, further reducing the duration of spring. The consequences of this seasonal imbalance are far-reaching. Ecologically, many plant and animal species rely on a stable seasonal

spring shortening, many species that depend on mild temperatures for breeding and blooming are struggling to adapt. Birds, for instance, are migrating earlier than usual, often finding that their food sources are not yet available. Similarly, early blooming

pected increase health risks, especially for vulnerable populations such as children, the elderly, and those with pre-existing health conditions. The heat also places enormous stress on power grids as air conditioners and cooling systems work overperienced an unusually warm February in 2024, with temperatures reaching 35°C—something that was once uncommon during the early spring months. This shift not only affects daily life but also has severe economic impacts, especially for sectors like agricul-

ture, where farmers are struggling to cope up with the unpredictable weather patterns. If this trend continues, the concept of spring as a distinct season may soon lose its existence. Immediate steps, such as reducing carbon emissions, increasing green cov-

er, and investing in sustainable energy, are necessary to slow down these changes. Without intervention, the already fragile balance of seasons will continue to collapse, making summers harsher and more unbearable in the com-



flowers are exposed to unexpected late frosts, leading to reduced crop yields and disruptions in ecosystems.

For humans, the sudden transition from winter to summer brings several challenges. The intense heat waves that come sooner than extime, leading to energy shortages and higher electricity bills.

## Women who broke confinement after 10 years in captivity

On May 6, 2013, the city of Cleveland witnessed a miracle when Amanda Berry called 911 from a neighbor's phone. She said, "I've been kidnapped and been missing for 10 years. I'm here. I'm free now," to the 911 operator. Berry, along with Gina DeJesus, and Michelle Knight, had been held captive for more than 9 years by Ariel Castro.

Just a day before her 17th birthday, Amanda Berry got up and got ready for work. She almost called off of work that day because the next day was her birthday. While walking home from work, a vehicle started to follow Berry down the street, and the man inside asked her if she needed a ride home. The man, Ariel Castro, was an elementary school bus driver

and the father of Berry's friend and classmate from middle school. He managed to get Berry to come over to his place. Castro took Berry upstairs and showed her something strange, a mystery woman sleeping in a bedroom in front of a television set. She later learned that the woman was Michelle Knight, who was abducted by Castro at 21 and had been held by him for

almost a year. As news of her abduction made headlines, Berry watched her mother and sister on the TV in the basement.

In 2003, the FBI was just starting to develop technology that could track a cell phone's location if it was turned on. With that information, they were able to narrow down that her phone had been used within a thirty to forty block area. In her diary,

Berry used a code to record how many times he raped her each day.

In 2006, Berry realized she might be pregnant on her 20th birthday. She gave birth to Jocelyn on Christmas in 2006. As Jocelyn grew older, Castro allowed her freedoms that Berry, DeJesus and Knight were not given. Though she was locked in with the three of them whenever Castro left the house, Jocelyn occasionally was allowed to go outside in the backyard, to the park or to Sunday services with her father. Castro's love for Jocelyn seemed to turn him into a different man with her. The women finally made

their escape after more than nine years in captivity. For the first time in 10 years, Berry said she found her bedroom door unlocked without Castro around. Downstairs, the front door was open but wired with an alarm. Beyond it, the storm door was padlocked shut, but Berry was still able to squeeze out an arm. Once Berry was out, she called for Jocelyn to crawl through the door. The two of them found a neighbor with a phone to call 911. Police arrived and rescued DeJesus and Knight. On Aug. 1, 2013, Castro was sentenced to life after he pleaded guilty to 937 counts of kidnapping and rape. On Sept. 3, 2013, he was found dead in his prison cell. He had killed himself. Berry now works with a local news station covering missing children and adults in the Cleveland area. The three women never gave up hope, and since their escape they have worked to help and heal others.

The aforementioned picture depicts that the vulture is a symbol of death and scavenging, hovers in the background, its presence as chilling as it is powerful. The position of innocence pitted against danger in this haunting photograph captures the parable called 'Life in the Harshest Conditions'. Yet it is the girl who is

weak yet trying her best to survive from the vulture as long she is able to. This striking moment reflects more than just a conventional vignette of a black and white dynamic between the predator and prey. It tells a story of a girl, perhaps from a desolate hamlet, who has fallen prey to the cruel symphony of death and survival.

Rather than putting an entire moment into an interregnum, Carter's polemical photograph serves as an introspection upon the implications of the perilous politics of penury, devastation and displacement faced by many who live in poverty-stricken, war-torn, or areas battling the throes of climate devastation. It speaks to the challenges that often go unnoticed by the dominant narratives of the outside world.

In the girl's eyes, one can see the story of countless individuals, struggling not just to survive, but to retain their dignity and will to endure. Quite harrowingly yet vividly it depicts a frail Sudanese girl curled up in exhaustion, while the vulture ominously waiting nearby and rearing its fangs. The picture became one of the most powerful symbols of famine and human suffering in photojournalism ,thereby shaping the moral responsibility and sociology of photography.In her acclaimed book of essays on the aesthetic, cultural and moral predicaments posed by photography - "On Photography"-the USA based

public intellectual Susan Sontag writes, while tracing the roots of photography as a vocation and a mode of artistic expression,that as photography is a widely practiced amusement, it has segued from an art to a social rite; a defense against anxiety and a tool to consolidate power. Further with her gifted pen she elaborates that gradually photography has attained an act of "non-intervention" which is witnessed in the horrors of situations when the photographer is obligated to make a choice between the camera's snap and the snap which can claim the subject's heartbeat such as the Vietnamese buddhist Thich Quang Duc who self-immolated himself on 11 June, 1963, by grabbing a gasoline can or the Bengali guerilla who bayoneted a trussedup collaborator during the infamous 1971 Indo-Pakistan war. An illuminating instance of the idea of photography being non-intervening in nature may be observed in Dziga Vertov's 1929 avant-garde masterpiece "Man with a Movie Camera",a film where the photographer is in perpetual state of movement to encompass an array of happenings whilst any form of intervention remains out of the question or even in the master of macabre Alfred Hitchcock's acclaimed "Rear Window(1954)" ,James Stewart's flawless performance as the wheelchair-bound photographer who is hellbent on clicking the camera as he is confined to a state of

inactivity. Thus, according to Sontag's analogy ,photography like voyeurism is a way to be complicit in allowing a phenomena to perpetuate itself explicitly or tacitly and thereby,keep the status-quo unscathed sans any blemish. The same was the case with Carter when his photo was published in "The New York Times" on March 26,1993 as the readers flooded the newspaper with skeptical inquiries and concerns over the child's fate. Kevin Carter was accused by many people of being a passive observer rather than an active helper. "Why didn't you help the child?" was a question

that haunted him.

In July 27,1994, when Kevin Carter claimed his life at the tender age of 33 when he left behind a suicide note expressing a deep sorrow over the horrors he witnessed and the emotional toll of his work.

Even Today, Carter's photograph remains one of the most powerful and resonating pieces in photojournalism for it is a stark reminder that famine, poverty, and suffering are not just products of a bygone epoch but ongoing crises that require urgent action via effective political discourse by governments and policy makers across the globe.

# Cinema in the spotlight: The biggest hits of early 2025






